First I really want to thanks all of you that filled out the data sharing survey in February. We had a great response of 74 participants, and what puzzled me most – from 18 different countries! We already are a truly international and interdisciplinary organization, and still growing. I am delighted to see that. Between the 20th and the 23rd of March 2010 the Steering Committee of the Polar Information Commons (PIC,

www.polarcommons.org) and others,

including IPY data managers and World Data System representatives (WDS, http://wds.geolinks.org) met in Paris at ICSU headquarters to move forward Polar data sharing ideas based on 'open access' and 'best practices', with the important goal of building a long-term data access legacy of the IPY, and all polar data. The PIC goal is to rapidly enhance international and interdisciplinary research, education, planning, and management for the polar regions.

At the IPY Oslo Science conference in June 2010, PIC will have an exhibit to inform about the PIC idea and data management. Additionally a presentation on PIC will be held in the data session (T5.4). Please take advantage of these possibilities to learn about PIC, and provide feedback to the PIC steering group. Building a long-term open-access community will only work when getting actively feedback from the user community to improve current shortcomings and facilitate a widely used cyberinfrastructure.

Arctic Science Summit Week 2010 in Nuuk / Copenhagen

The Arctic Science Summit Week 2010 was held from in Nuuk (Greenland) this year - and in Copenhagen - from April 15 - 18, 2010 (plus a week thanks to Iceland's

volcano!). APECS Director Jenny Baeseman and President Gerlis Fugmann both attended the event in Nuuk.



The programme contained three days of meetings by the International Arctic Sciences Committee (IASC), Arctic Ocean Sciences Board (AOSB), European Polar Board (EPB), Pacific Arctic Group (PAG) and Forum of Arctic Research Operators (FARO), as well

as one Common Day with scientific presentations and a boat excursion. However, the volcanic eruption in Iceland turned this into an unusual event for all participants. Only half of the delegates were able to travel to Nuuk (before the eruption) and the rest was stuck in Copenhagen. Therefore, meetings had to be held either with a reduced number of participants in Nuuk or via video conference with the rest of the delegates in Copenhagen.

Invitation to participate in a survey on wilderness and aesthetic values of Antarctica

I am writing to ask for your help with circulating an invitation to participate in a survey on wilderness and aesthetic values of Antarctica. The survey, which is part of my PhD research, investigates perceptions of wilderness and aesthetic quality in Antarctic landscapes. I was wondering whether you might be able to include an item on your website inviting your members to take part?

Although wilderness and aesthetic values are listed among the environmental values to be protected under the Madrid Protocol there has been little research on how these values should be assessed. The results of this survey will, I hope, contribute to the development of guidelines for the assessment and protection of wilderness and aesthetic values as required by the Madrid Protocol.



SCAR Fellowship Scheme 2010-11

Deadline Saturday 15th May 2010



Fellowships are intended to allow researchers from one SCAR Member country to undertake short term visits to major international laboratories, field facilities, and/or home institutions in or operated by another SCAR Member country, so as to become acquainted with recent advances in research and/or to develop long-term scientific links and partnerships.

The work must be carried out in a research group of a SCAR nation different from that of the applicant's origin.

Awards will be up to US\$15,000, providing, as needed, economy-class round trip travel and a modest subsistence allowance for the fellowship period. The Fellow's home institute will bear all expenses incurred in his or her own nation (domestic travel, visa costs, etc.), and the host institute will waive any bench fees that they might normally charge trainees. Three to four awards will be made in total depending on the quality of the applications and the budget available.

Calling Early Career Scientists: NSF Planning Workshop On Land-Ice Contributions To Future Sea Level

11 - 14 July, 2010

A four-day workshop will be convened July 11-14, 2010, in Sterling, VA, to develop a Science and Implementation Plan on Land-Ice Contributions to Future Sea Level. We invite members of the research community who are interested in participating in the workshop to submit a one-page statement of interest explaining their background and how it fits within the context of the



workshop goals. For the workshop to be successful, the participating scientists must be able to recognize and acknowledge the relevant contributions of other communities to the specific goal of projecting future sea-level rise.

In addition, balance in stage of career, gender and race will be considered in the selection process, as will the potential to provide new perspectives. To include the youngest perspectives, we encourage graduate students and post-docs to submit documentation to be considered for one of the six spots reserved for them to participate in the workshop. All travel costs will be covered for U.S. participants.

Arctic Science Summit Week 2011, 1st Circular is available

28 March - 1 April 2011

A preparation for Arctic Science Summit Week 2011 that will be held in Seoul, South Korea next spring, is in progress and the organizing committee has just released a 1st Circular for the meeting. Recall that following a successful experience of ASSW 2009 in Bergen, it is planned to combine business meetings with a 3-day scientific symposium. During ASSW 2011, a number of APECS activities and early career scientists' involvement will be supported by the Organizing Commitee and IASC.
